George Thompson

It was a very sad occasion at the end of August when many of the Society's members attended the funeral of George Thompson. He was 97 years old when he died on 3rd

August. The funeral service was held at Christ Church in Bedford and was conducted by Reverend Canon Richard Hibbert. The Anthem "Ave Verum Corpus" was sung by Bedford Choral Society of which George had been a member and members of Stewartby Operatic Society sang "The Long Day Closes" by Arthur Sullivan to accompany the withdrawal of the coffin.



George had been active with Stewartby
Operatic Society from its very early days
having joined the Society in 1956. He was
musical director on many occasions including
the 1959 and 1974 productions of Patience,
appeared on stage, took the publicity
photographs, was an honorary life member
and had been a Vice-President of the Society
for many years. His last performance was in

Iolanthe in November 2008 but he continued to attend rehearsals and see the shows until quite recently.

George lead a very full life including serving in the RAF during

the Second World War and working as photographer at the Bedfordshire Times. In 2005 he gave an account of his life in the RAF to Bedford Museum and this appears in two parts on the BBC website as part of "WW2 People's War: an archive of World War Two memories - written by the public, gathered by the BBC". 

Patience

Patience was first performed by the Society in 1953 and since then in 1959, 1974, 1984, 1997 and 2007. The programmes from each of those performances are, or soon will be, available to view on the Society's website at www.saods.org.uk on the "Past Shows" pages.



The six previous productions have had six different producers - and this year's production will add a seventh - but only four different musical directors with both

George Thompson and Allan Thomas having directed twice.


It is noticeable looking through the programmes how the numbers of chorus members have changed over the years: In 1953 there were 16 ladies and 12 gentlemen in the chorus and by 2007 these numbers had declined to 11 ladies and 4 gentlemen! This reflects the Society's increasing difficulties in attracting men, in particular, to

join in with the performances and leads to our regular invitations to anyone, male or female, to join us.



In 1953 the role of Colonel Calverley was taken by John Kitchiner who also played Archibald Grosvenor in the 1959 production. On the website at www.saods.org.uk there is a photograph from 1959, provided by the musical director, George Thompson, who comments "I am conducting a performance of Patience in which John Kitchiner is playing Archibald. He was an excellent baritone who went on to sing professionally with Benjamin Britten and went on to sing principal parts with Sadlers Wells (which I think became National Opera)".

Also of great interest in the programmes are the advertisements. Do you remember "Braggins - The House Of Good Values" (1953), "Frasers - For Everything Musical" (1953), "Shopping is a pleasure at The Dudeney and Johnston Supermarket" (1959)?





Planning is already well advanced for the concert next spring. This will take place in Stewartby Village Hall on Friday 5th and Saturday 6th May 2017. There will be a wide variety of songs of different styles, fitting in, somehow, with the ABC theme, from "There Was An Old Lady Who Swallowed A Fly" to "What A Wonderful World", made famous by Louis Armstrong; from "My Secret Love" from Calamity Jane to "We'll Gather Lilacs" by Ivor Novello; from Pinnochio's "When You Wish Upon A Star" to "Land Of Hope And Glory". As with last year's concert the music will be led by Colin Jones and the choreography by Carol Wallman. Also, by popular request - a couple of people mentioned that they liked it last year - there will be a quiz running through the evening with prizes to be won.

If you would like to take part the first rehearsal will be at 7.30pm on Thursday 12th January at Stewartby United Church Hall, Park Crescent, Stewartby and every Thursday thereafter.

If you would prefer to sit back and enjoy the entertainment and the interval meal look out for news of when tickets go on sale.
