Our performances on stage in Milton Keynes have been curtailed this year.



Members responded to the question "If rehearsals resumed at Stewartby Church Hall in October would you consider attending?"



Of the 72.4% of respondents who said possibly, probably or yes to considering attending rehearsals the majority declared that they were willing to sing, but preferably not whilst wearing face coverings, to sing music for future concerts and to sing Christmas music. Greetings from Jenny Hall

Our holiday to India was inspired by a young man named Neil Cooper whom I had known from babyhood. When he sold his business 'Coopers of Stortford' a few years ago he made a lot of money and he and his wife, Kate, decided to help some very poor Indian children with their education. The children lived in immense poverty in villages in the middle of a jungle in south India. Although they did go to school they had nowhere to do their homework as the tiny huts they lived in had no electricity and were totally unsuitable. This prompted Neil and Kate to build five tuition centres — one in each village. They kitted them all out with desks, blackboards and other educational necessities and a teacher/helper as well to supervise and help the children after school. In order to help with the continued



running of these establishments they set up a charity called 'Grace Charitable Trust' and each year they organised a holiday at a hotel set right in the middle of the jungle. Everyone who went on these holidays paid a sum of money for the holiday and an equal amount to the charity. I felt so proud of them and what they were doing to help these very poor children that we decided to support them and we booked to go in February 2020.

I had grown up in South India and had always dreamt of taking my two girls there. Very tragically, Neil went out just before Christmas last year, to take presents to the children and was taken very ill and died at the age of 58. I was absolutely devastated that someone who was doing so much good should have been taken so sadly and suddenly. We all thought the holiday would be cancelled but, very bravely, his wife decided that it would still go on and so we went.

We flew to Bangalore first and visited many of the familiar places of my childhood including the church we attended and my old school. We had pre-arranged the school visit and they welcomed us with open arms, laying on a splendid tea party for us. Walking

around the school and grounds was very nostalgic, I had really loved that school.

After a few short days in Bangalore we were on our way to the jungle hotel — a six hour journey by car! Our accommodation was in very well appointed units dotted around the area right in the heart of the jungle. It was such a wonderful experience as we could lie in bed in the early mornings and watch the animals around: deer, monkeys, wild boar and we even saw quite a few wild elephants. Sadly and disappointingly, although we were



told there were 55 tigers in the area, we did not see a single one.

Each day we were taken on trips to places of interest including the local schools, villages and all the tuition centres. The visits to the villages were a really humbling experience. The huts were very small, dark and with hardly any furniture in them. The tiny windows had no glass and everywhere was extremely dirty. There were many domesticated animals



roaming around with all the accompanying mess they produce. The people seemed so happy, however, and the children were simply delightful, always smiling and so excited with our visit. On one of the days a sports competition had been organised between all the villages. There was great rivalry and the winning village children were all presented with cups which you would have thought were made of solid gold for the pleasure it gave them. It was a truly wonderful spectacle to watch and be part of.

The next stage of our holiday was to Goa where we stayed at a family run hotel that Neil had recommended. This was a really relaxing few days to soak in the warmth, enjoy the sights, the food, the shopping and just generally chill out, before returning home to a very cold late February! Shortly after we returned we had lockdown. We couldn't believe how lucky we had been to have managed to complete the holiday. My daughter summed it up by saying it had been the holiday of a lifetime! It had been a great

time for us all, and had fulfilled a lifelong dream of mine.



The important point to remember is that rehearsals, unlike pre-Covid, cannot be social gatherings (where the rule of six applies indoors). It may be possible to socialise before and after rehearsals, outside the hall, as long as government guidelines are adhered to.

At the time of writing this another lockdown has been announced in England which may change future planning.
