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


This year's Gilbert and Sullivan production is The Gondoliers and will be on stage on Wednesday 15th, Thursday 16th and Friday 17th November at 7.30pm each night and also on Saturday 18th November at 2.30pm.

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Last year's experiment with a Saturday matinee instead of evening performance of The Mikado proved very successful. It seems that people like the afternoon performance as they can arrive in daylight and get home in good time for a cosy evening in front of the television (perhaps). It is also much more convenient for bringing younger people along to experience the fun and glorious music of Gilbert and Sullivan. The earlier finish on Saturday was also popular with members of the Society as it meant that everything could be dismantled and packed away well before bedtime!



With almost all the tickets sold in advance of the matinee performance last year, don't delay if you are thinking of seeing this year's production on Saturday. Indeed, don't delay for any day. Tickets for The Gondoliers are priced at £15 for adults and £7.50 for children and are available to buy online - go to our web site - or through our business manager Mike Cocke on 07557 670703, at boxoffice@saods.org.uk or through cast members at rehearsals. We will be running a licensed bar serving a limited range of drinks.

All the contadine (country girls) in Venice are besotted by the gondoliers Marco and Giuseppe Palmieri who announce that they will pick their brides through a game of blind-man's-buff, and after some crafty play catch Gianetta and Tessa - just the girls they wanted! The remaining girls accept their fate, pair off with the other previously ignored gondoliers and hurry off to be married.

The impoverished Duke and Duchess of Plaza-Toro, with their daughter Casilda and their 'suite', Luiz, arrive in Venice from Spain, to seek the husband whom Casilda married in infancy, the son of the King of Barataria. Following political upheaval and for his protection the young prince was

taken from the court by Don Alhambra del Bolero, the Grand Inquisitor of Spain, and brought up ignorant of his true identity as one of the family by Mr Palmieri. Now it is time for the prince to ascend the throne with Casilda at his side. The difficulty is that the old man was very fond of the local wine and, as a result, couldn't remember which child was which. Only the woman who nursed the young prince can identify him and she has gone missing. The Grand Inquisitor is on the case,

determined to locate the prince's foster mother and to extract the vital information from her.

The news that Casilda is married sends her and Luiz into despair, for they are secretly in love, but they have to conceal their anguish.

Don Alhambra reveals to the newly married Marco and Giuseppe that one of them is a King, and that they are both to be taken to Barataria immediately. Though they are both Republicans, they

> manage to overcome their political scruples and promise to give their friends places at court.

After a fond farewell to the girls - for Don Alhambra craftily tells them that ladies are not allowed in court the men sail off to Barataria.

In Act II we see that the gondoliers have quickly set up a relaxed 'Republican Monarchy' where the only pleasure

missing is the company of their wives. This is soon remedied by the arrival of all the contadine. The situation gets complicated, however, when Don Alhambra reveals to Marco and Giuseppe that one of them is a bigamist, having been married to Casilda as a baby. This throws everyone into a state of anxiety, except for the Duke and Duchess, who have found a range of moneymaking methods. Finally Tessa and Gianetta encounter Casilda.

Only the arrival of Inez, the former nurse can throw light on the problem and reveal to all the rightful King of Barataria - will it be Marco or Giuseppe?

The Gondoliers

The background

Sullivan was tiring of composing for comic operas and found their last collaboration, the slightly more serious "The Yeomen of the Guard", more to his taste. Gilbert, however, was mindful of the relative lack of success of Yeomen and suggested the return to lighter works with "The Gondoliers". After some lively correspondence and the intervention of Richard D'Oyly Carte, Sullivan mellowed and agreed to compose for another comic opera. Gilbert also compromised by adapting his original plot to one set in Venice, where Sullivan had recently had an enjoyable holiday, and giving the composer fifteen minutes or so of uninterrupted music in the opening sequence.

After several months preparation the first orchestra rehearsal took place only five days before the opening night, after which Sullivan stayed up most of the night composing the overture. It was only then that the pair agreed on the title "The Gondoliers".

"The Gondoliers" opened on 7th December 1889, ran for 559 performances until 20th June 1891 and met with almost universal acclaim from critics and public alike.

Our production of The Gondoliers is set in the 1950s to commemorate the Society's first production of this show in 1954 when we were still the Stewartby School Operatic and Dramatic Society


like to join us on stage, rehearsals will begin in January 2024. If you would like to join the audience look out for announcements nearer the time for ticket sales to open.
